## **KNOW YOUR RIGHTS**

**YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE EARLY** using one of two easy ways:

- Vote in person at your county Board of Elections, or its designated early voting location, from October 4 to November 4; or
- Vote early from home by requesting a mail-in absentee ballot from your county Board of Elections no later than noon on November 5.

Return your ballot as soon as possible to make sure it's counted. It **MUST** be either postmarked by November 7 or hand-delivered, by you or a family member, to the Board office by 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday, November 8.

### **ID Is Easier When You Vote Absentee**

All you have to do is fill out your ID Envelope with either the last four digits of your Social Security number or your Ohio Driver's License number (*this number is listed directly below your address — it's **NOT** the number over your photo!*)

**YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** on Election Day, Tuesday, November 8, between 6:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. *As long as you are in line by 7:30 p.m. you must be allowed to vote.*

**YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** a regular ballot if your name is in the poll book and you provide **ONE** acceptable form of identification, including:

- An Ohio Driver's License or Ohio Photo ID Card that is valid and unexpired (*even if it shows a former address that doesn't match the registration address in the poll book*); or
  - Military Identification that shows your name (does not need to show address); or
  - Any of the below forms of ID are valid **ONLY IF** they show your name and current address, and were either issued within a year of Election Day or have not expired:
    - Utility Bill (including ones issued by **any** college or university)
    - Bank Statement
    - Government Check
    - Payroll Check
    - Other Government Document (including documents from a **public** college or university. However, notices mailed to you by a Board of Elections **MAY NOT** be used as voting ID)
  - Federal Photo ID (but not a passport)
- **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** a regular paper ballot if your county uses touch screen voting machines and you would prefer a paper ballot.
  - **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** a provisional ballot if your name does not appear on the poll list or if you don't have identification.
  - **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO RECEIVE ANOTHER BALLOT** from election officials if you make a mistake. You may receive up to 3 ballots in total.

### **Provisional Ballots**

If you must vote with a provisional ballot, check to make sure that you are in both the correct polling place *and also* in the correct precinct. Please be certain to fill out the form completely by printing your name, providing the last four digits of your social security number, and signing the affidavit.

- **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO SPECIAL ASSISTANCE** in the voting booth if English is not your first language, if you cannot read or write, or if you are blind or otherwise disabled.
- **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** at your vehicle or outside the facility if you are unable to enter the polling place due to a disability.
- **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** without being intimidated by any person.
- **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** during work hours without retaliation by your employer.
- **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE** by absentee ballot if you are in jail, unless you are in jail on a felony conviction. Convicted felons released from prison (even if on probation or parole) have the right to vote after re-registering.
